

### How does it work?

Try revision boxes as a creative alternative to posters. Students use craft material to create 3D revision boxes where they display keywords, notes, symbols and diagrams to represent everything they need to know about a topic.

### Who's it for?

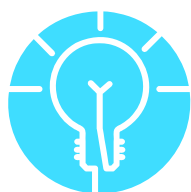
Groups and individuals of all levels and abilities. The act of physically creating the revision boxes is part of the revision process itself, and engaging with learning in this creative way makes it memorable.

### What you need ...

Empty cardboard boxes, sticky tape, glue, scissors, coloured pens, paper and card, string, newspapers, magazines, plus any other craft material available.

#### Step by step

- Students work individually or in groups of up to 3.
- Select or allocate topics for students to work on. They work together to create 3D representations of a topic.
- Allocate a time limit for the task, and then ask students to present their box to the rest of the group.
- Students could use sticky notes to add suggestions to the outside of the other boxes.
- Students could be encouraged to show links between the topic boxes by using string and labels to join the boxes.



#### Further teaching ideas ...

Display the models and encourage students to look at them during lessons in the lead up to exams.
